Overview

The City and County of Denver's Department of Community
Planning and Development (CPD) facilitates the Neighborhood
Planning Initiative, an effort to develop a community-driven vision,
plan, and priorities for every neighborhood in Denver.
Neighborhood plans reflect what residents care most about and
inform how city decision-makers prioritize important neighborhood
projects related to land use, mobility and quality of life.

Planning for Equity

Adopted by City Council in 2019, Denver's Comprehensive Plan 2040 defines equity as the conditions in which, "everyone, regardless of who they are or where they come from, has the opportunity to thrive." A key goal of Blueprint Denver, Denver's citywide land use and transportation plan, is to guide change in the city to improve equity for all. To do this, the plan looks at equity through three main ideas:

- Access to Opportunity
- Vulnerability to Displacement
- · Diversity of Housing & Jobs

By focusing on these ideas, the plan highlights areas where equity is a concern and helps create recommendations to make Denver more equitable. For the Southwest Area Plan, these three ideas have shaped the strategies and recommendations, especially in areas that need more focus on equity.

Creating a 20-year vision for your neighborhood

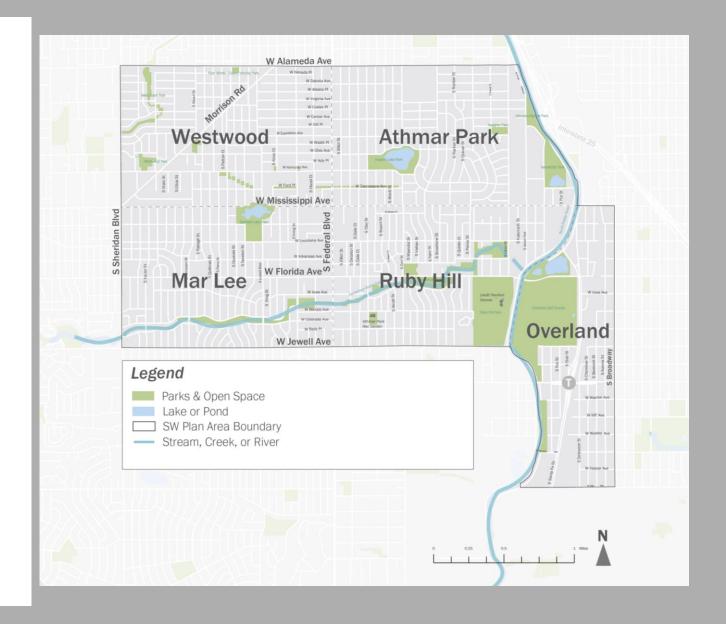
The Southwest Area planning process began in 2024. Throughout the fall, the planning team conducted extensive community engagement to collect public feedback. The input collected through online surveys, public events and community conversations in every neighborhood resulted in the first draft of a 20-year vision for Southwest Denver.

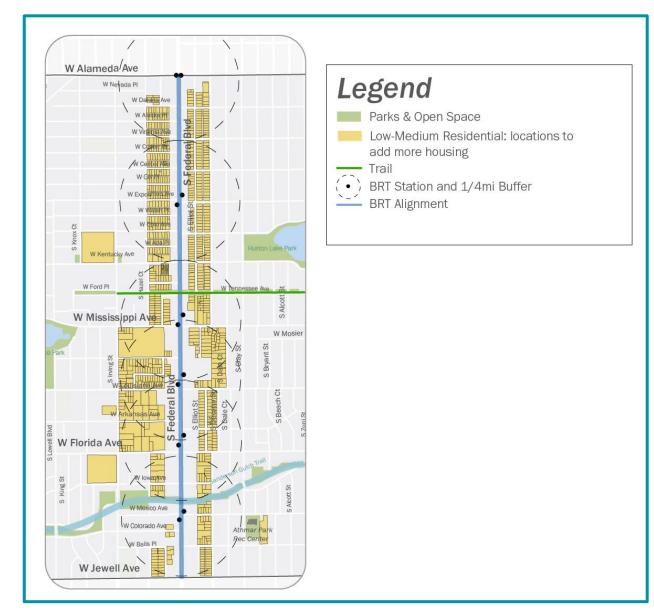

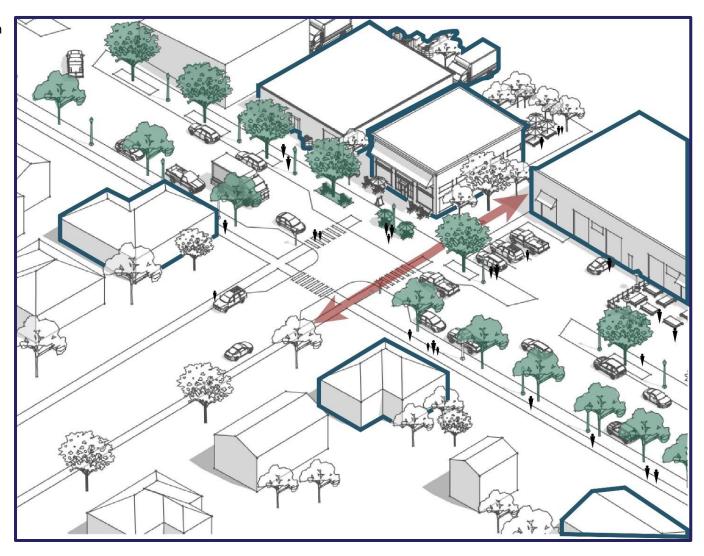

- Reduce impacts of heavy truck traffic on residential areas (M9)
- Add **green infrastructure** such as trees near schools, parks and community centers (M11)
- Add **ADA-compliant** and detached sidewalks to local streets (M13)
- Improve busy intersections where lots of people cross (M14)
- Increase vehicle **compliance at 2-way and 4-way stop** intersections (M15)
- Enhance **pedestrian and cyclist comfort**, safety and access (M1/2/5/6/12/17)

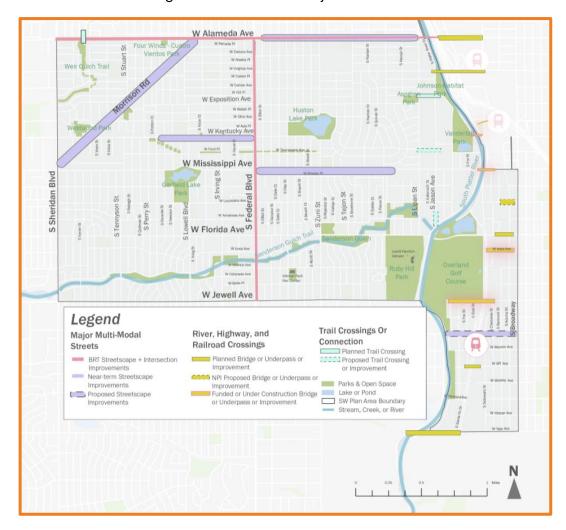

The following high-level recommendations are intended to enhance pedestrian and cyclist comfort and safety.

- Build new bikeway connections (M4)
- Create **green streets** for biking and stormwater management (M16)
- Connect existing **bike trails** to parks and neighborhood destinations (M5)
- Build **safe crossings** under or over major highways, rivers, and railroads (M1)
- Ensure **major roads feel safe and comfortable** for all residents (M2)
- Improve pedestrian crossings to key community destinations (M12)

Federal Boulevard

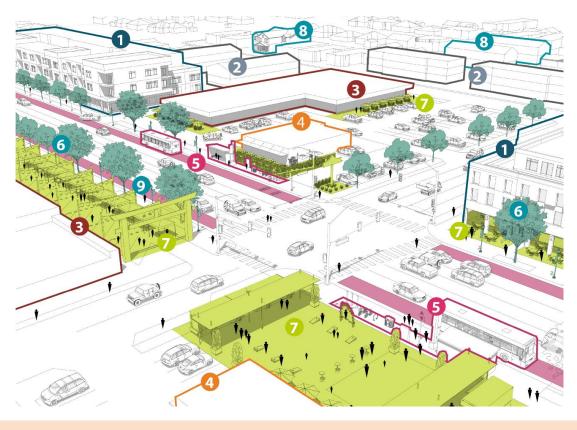
2045 Vision

Federal Boulevard will support all types of travel with efficient bus rapid transit, improved safety, and better pedestrian access. Green infrastructure will increase, along with access to healthy, diverse foods, affordable housing, and public art reflecting the area's multicultural character.

Little Saigon, a key cultural hub for Denver's Asian community, will be preserved and celebrated. Efforts will focus on supporting small businesses, enhancing public spaces, and expanding community events. Transitoriented development will improve walkability and access to transit.

Key Recommendations

- Mixed-use, pedestrian-friendly development near BRT stations.
- 2. Preserve existing affordable housing options for neighborhood residents.
- 3. Retain and preserve culturally significant local businesses.
- 4. Encourage small-scale redevelopment and adaptive reuse to increase commercial opportunities for small and minority-owned businesses.
- 5. BRT station design should reflect the cultural significance of the Little Saigon district with unique elements that promote a strong sense of place.
- 6. Upgrade the streetscape and tree canopy along Federal Boulevard to improve the safety, comfort, and desirability of walking and rolling.
- 7. Expand community gathering places through small parks, plazas, outdoor dining, and market or festival spaces.
- 8. Allow duplex, triplex, and quadplex housing options two blocks away from Federal that support affordability and fit within the neighborhood character.
- 9. Streetscape elements with a consistent design unique to Little Saigon should be explored to promote a district-wide sense of place.



Morrison Road

2045 Vision

Morrison Road will remain a **cultural and community hub**, with design elements celebrating its unique areas. **Improved streetscaping** will enhance its appearance.

Nearby areas will offer diverse, **affordable housing**, including family and intergenerational options.

The Commercial and Arts District (Perry to Alameda) will be strengthened as a gateway, while the Core Entertainment District (Perry to Sheridan) will support a mix of uses with higher residential density. Future development will be mindful of the area's character and promote shared and local businesses.

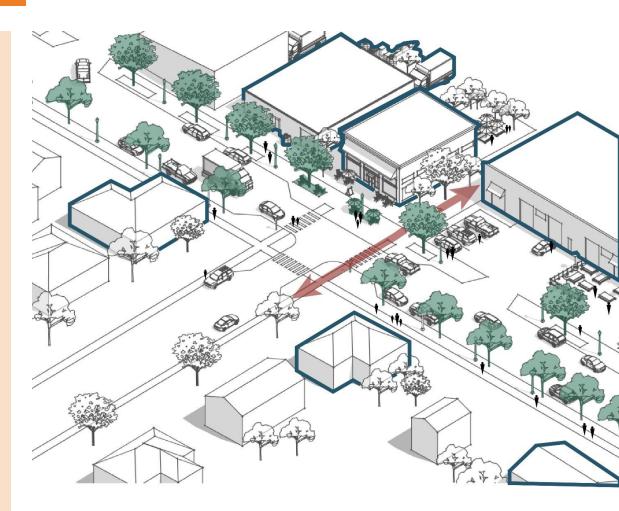
Lipan Street

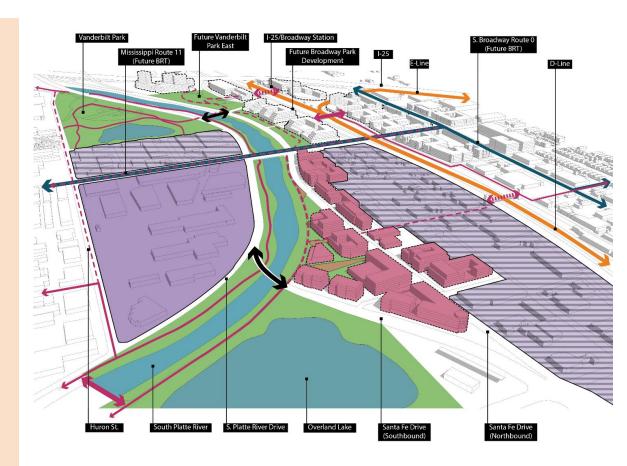
Santa Fe
