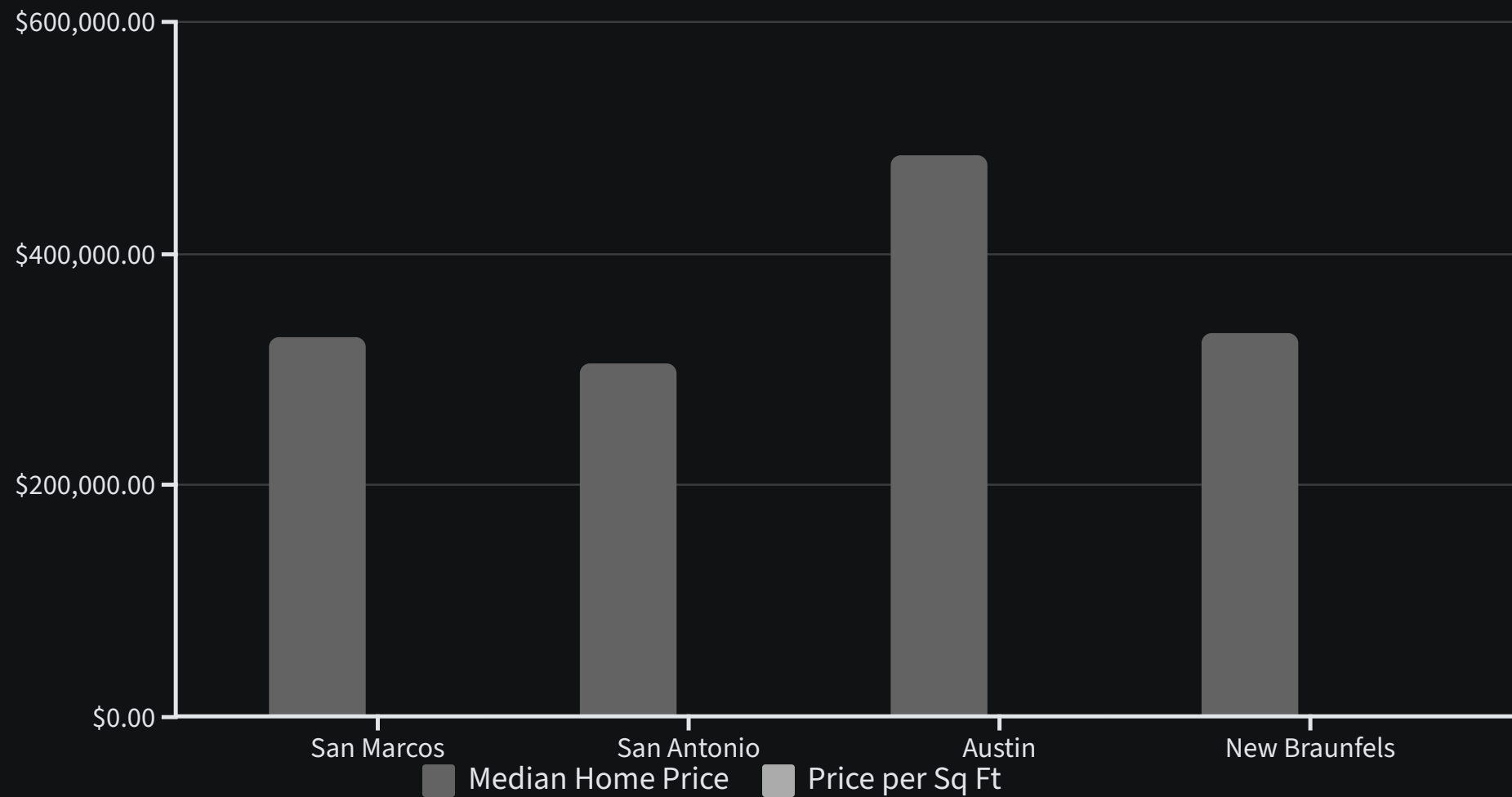

Housing Market Analysis: What to Expect

The median sale price of a home in San Marcos was \$327K last month, up 1.7% since last year. The median sale price per square foot in San Marcos is \$200, down 3.1% since last year. The average San Marcos, TX home value is \$326,154, down 4.9% over the past year and goes to pending in around 54 days.

The San Marcos housing market is somewhat competitive. Homes in San Marcos receive 1 offers on average and sell in around 61 days. San Marcos's median sale price is 27% lower than the national average, creating opportunities for qualified buyers across all income levels while maintaining affordability compared to nearby Austin.



The city has a mixture of owners and renters, with 29.7% owning and 70.3% renting. Most development happened in recent decades, with 16.8% of homes added from 2000 to 2009, 27.3% between 2010 and 2019, and 3.8% part of the newest wave of development. Texas has no state income tax, providing additional financial benefits for residents.

Education Excellence: Schools & Universities

San Marcos is served by San Marcos Consolidated Independent School District, which covers 210 miles and serves more than 7,500 students who attend six elementary schools, two middle schools, and one high school. The district provides comprehensive education from Pre-K through 12th grade, with strong connections to higher education through Texas State University.



Elementary Schools

In San Marcos CISD, 47% of elementary students tested at or above the proficient level for reading, and 29% tested at or above that level for math. The district operates six elementary campuses serving diverse communities with comprehensive early childhood programs and specialized services for gifted and talented students.



Middle Schools

34% of middle school students tested at or above the proficient level for reading, and 20% tested at or above that level for math. The district's two middle schools offer comprehensive programs including athletics, fine arts, and academic competitions to prepare students for high school success.



High School & University

In the Class of 2023, 86.3% of students received their high school diplomas on time or earlier. San Marcos High School offers advanced placement courses, career technology courses and dual enrollment at Texas State and Austin Community College. Texas State University awarded 8,781 degrees in 2023, providing exceptional higher education opportunities.

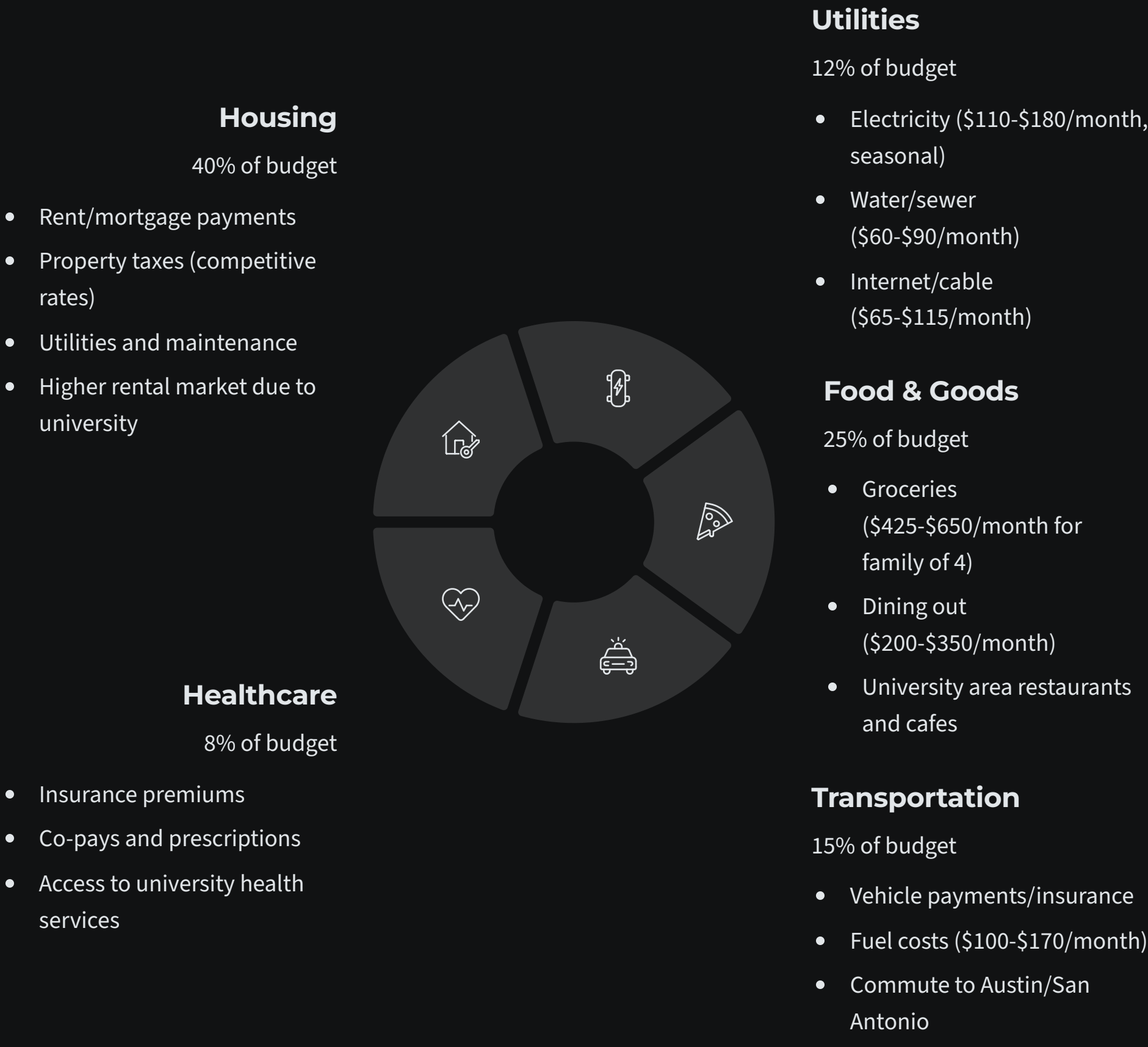
